A Difficult Time

A number of years ago, when I was free on Wednesday evenings, I began attending the mid-week Bible Study at Faith Community Church. This was part of an expanding relationship in which my history with Nelson and Joyce Johnson grew in a variety of ways; including our two families joining a delegation representing Greensboro's Truth and Reconciliation process in a trip to South Africa. This Bible Study was different in a variety of ways, but perhaps the most remarkable was that occasionally a young person who was struggling with life would show up. What amazed me was how gracious the members of Faith were with the "stranger walking in off the street". This is where my mind went last Thursday when I heard about the horrific attack at 'Mother' Emanuel AME Church in Charleston, SC.

Given our complicated economic and political conflicts, I have some understanding regarding the racial divide in our country. However, I have never been able to get my head around the racial divide in our churches. This reality, plus the connection that my family and so many other members of Covenant have had with Faith Community Church and the Johnson family, generated the thought of Covenant joining Faith Community at this tragic time. I was not at all surprised by the warm response of Nelson and Joyce to this idea.

I was also heartened by the positive response of Covenant's Session and the good turnout of our people on Sunday. Nelson and I shared thoughts about Charleston, Lou offered a wonderful prayer, and then members of Faith Community, Covenant and Epiphany shared their own concerns and hopes. Building on the amazing faith of the members at 'Mother' Emanuel AME Church, our comments became far more positive than I could have imagined. As Susan Andreatta shared her concern for her daughter living in Charleston it became clear that we all have a vested interest in finding ways for resurrection to come from this heinous action.

William Barber, North Carolina leader of the Moral Monday movement, made the remark that "the perpetrator has been apprehended but the killer is still at large". This is, of course, a reference to the systemic nature of racism that produced a Dylann Roof. Dylann now faces the consequences of his actions; what remains less clear is whether we, as a church and as a nation, will see our own complicity and exercise our courage for a new tomorrow.

Below is the mission statement of the Church of Reconciliation in Chapel Hill, NC.

Church of Reconciliation (PCUSA)

We are called to proclaim in word and action the gospel of Jesus Christ. We are guided by a vision that neither race nor gender, neither ethnic origin nor sexual orientation, neither age nor infirmity, neither marital status nor educational background, neither economic condition nor any other aspect of personhood will divide this Christian community, this household of God, for we are one in God's love. We are to work for justice, reconciliation, and peace.

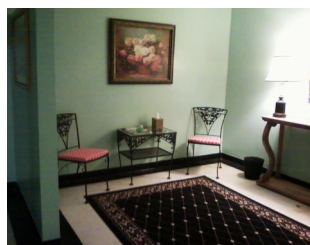
We are to 'do justice, love mercy, and walk humbly with our God.'

“From our earliest days, we’ve followed the beat of a different drum. In 1966, in the still-segregated South, our founders answered God’s call for an intentional community of racial reconciliation, hence our church name. We remain true to our origins: we are a theologically-diverse faith community where anyone who is on a spiritual journey can find encouragement, challenge, and support to grow.

As a progressive church in the Presbyterian tradition, we are strongly committed to peace and social justice. We believe we are called to cultivate a culture of peace in our interior lives, in our interpersonal relationships, and in our social witness. The Rec is widely known as a faith community whose members walk their walk.”



A Note from Barbara North (Chairperson, Interiors Committee)

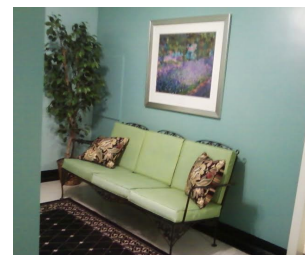
