Musings on Progressive Christianity ...

Progressive Christianity is about a refusal to believe that I have to stay in a rut. I am not helpless; I am not a depraved sinner; I need not be a pawn of overwhelming, outside forces. I am not condemned by "original sin", and I do not need to focus significant time and energy on life after death. Tomorrow will be managed by forces beyond my touch — today is good enough for me. I can live and give myself to eternal forces, both within and beyond me, that are shaping this moment. I have limitations, but I am created in the image of God, and can work for transformation in my own life without selling my soul to others.

Progressive Christianity is about the truth that I can think for myself. I can think and act in ways that diverge from the mainstream; especially from those persons who are presently at the helm of church, state, and corporate structure. I now choose ways that are consistent with my own imagination, creativity and best thinking. I define and design what I find to be true, and I choose to enact these definitions and designs. I explore and venture outside the box. I follow my own strongest life convictions even though these life convictions will often not be well received by the larger world. I dream my own dreams.

Still, Progressive Christianity is about more than just finding liberation for my own soul. I see a direct connection between my true self and the Spirit of Life that is working to redeem and reconstruct this earthly home. Powers and Principalities seem to have a vested interest in keeping us dependent and small. These forces of domination are present within and outside the church, and minimize those biblical teachings that depict the Kingdom as revolutionary grace. I choose to move forward with or without approval from others, but I celebrate each friend who is on this journey with me. I know that I have been called into community; that I need to be in vital, mutually respectful relationships. For ultimately my own liberation is tied into the jubilee of all life – in an ever expanding Universe.



In many ways, we are living at a *tipping point* in which we must learn how to regain trust in one another and live into healthy, long-term life patterns that sustain wholeness and possibility.

What is it going to take for us to reshape the world in which we live? What role can the Church play? A New Kind of Christianity: Ten Questions That Are Transforming the Faith by Brian McLaren

Some depressing factors have shaped sectors of the Christian faith in recent decades: polarization, politicization, spiritual decline, loss of identity, and just plain close-mindedness to exploring new ways of thinking. But a number of leaders see more potential at work as new expressions are coming into public discourse, and evolve into new ways to be church. One of the more positive voices for change in recent years has been Brian McLaren, a vital force for

the *Wild Goose Festival*, inspiring progressive leaders from all over the U.S. to gather for national events, helping spirited folk in shaping a new faith. Brian believes that we are in the midst of a paradigm shift in the church. Not since the Reformation five centuries ago have so many Christians come together to ask whether the church is in sync with their deepest beliefs and commitments.

One of Brian's most well-received books is "A New Kind of Christianity: Ten Questions That Are Transforming the Faith". After years of traveling around the world to lead workshops for those who are exploring new ways of visioning the Christian faith, Brian came to recognize that, no matter where he travelled, there were common questions guiding the vital conversations of these pilgrim people. In this book, McLaren examines ten questions facing today's church—questions about how to articulate the faith itself, the nature of its authority, who God is, whether we need to understand Jesus through an ancient Greco-Roman lens, what exactly the good news is that the gospel proclaims, how we understand the church and all its varieties, why we are so preoccupied with sex, how we should think of the future and people from other faiths, and the most intimidating question of all: what do we do next? During the months of June and July we will be exploring these 10 questions, and no doubt will raise a few of our own.

Having two supportive sisters, Nancy and Jaime, always available for Marty meant that he had a strong, caring network to help him navigate the more challenging times. The calling, however, was about more than awards. Here was a young man, God-blessed in his own unique ways, and here was a family that would see to it that their son, their brother, would keep on keeping on.

Living in a world that is ensconced in too many patterned ways, it can be liberating for all of us to see a young man – with his parents and siblings – break with the traditional molds and demonstrate for all of us the real wonder of our human family. *Chris*
