The season of Lent has been understood as a time of preparation, reflecting the journey of Jesus from the relative peace of Galilee to a pressure-packed Jerusalem where careful allegiance to orthodoxy was viewed as critically important if the nation was to keep the peace with Pontius Pilate. We might be critical of religious leaders in Jerusalem who were often engaged in 'damage control', but then we speak as those who do not know what it means to be a nation under continual occupation by a foreign Empire that routinely uses intimidation to control.

This may be why many of us, no matter our religious affiliation, continue to be hopeful as we observe Pope Francis. I really appreciate his effort to keep his focus upon those whom we might be able to serve. Here are a few words from his recent Lenten message;

"Lent is a time of renewal; a 'time of grace' ... a time [to release] an attitude of indifference. Christians are those who let God clothe them with goodness and mercy ... so as to become, like Christ, servants of God and others. Saint Therese of Lisieux expressed her conviction that joy in heaven ... remains incomplete as long as there is still a single man or woman on earth who suffers and cries out in pain. ... Every Christian community is called to go out of itself and to be engaged in the life of the greater society of which it is a part, especially with the poor.

In each of our neighbors, then, we must see a brother or sister for whom Christ died. The Church is present [as] islands of mercy in the midst of the sea of indifference! As a way of overcoming indifference ..., I would invite everyone to live this Lent as an opportunity for engaging in what Benedict XVI called a formation of the heart. A merciful heart means ... a strong and steadfast heart. A heart which lets itself be pierced by the Spirit so as to bring love along the roads that lead to our brothers and sisters."

Historically, the heart has been used as a metaphor to represent the very *core* of an individual. Though piercing this core may sound extreme, if we are swimming in a sea of global indifference, then Francis may be right on target.

How might you observe Lent? How might you navigate the 'sea of indifference' with intentional practices that will make a difference for those in need around you? Blessings on your journey.

Sunday Study Series/Groups for March

2014 Financial Summary Report

FINANCIAL SUMMARY – DECEMBER, 2014

The church collected a little over \$241,000 of revenue in 2014, a decline from 2013 of about 13.5%, or about \$37,700. A little over half of the total revenue received came from contributions - about \$136,100. Rent collected from users of our building and parking lots added another \$103,750 to our accounts. Interest from our investments and utility refunds make up the remainder of our income.

Total expenses for the year were a little over \$260,400, a 9% drop from 2013 expenses of \$285,700. About 75% of those expenses went to pay the staff, \$110,945; and for the upkeep and routine expenses for our building and grounds, \$90,000. Office and postage expenses were \$16,525; contributions to Salem Presbytery were \$12,000; and our music program expenses were a little over \$18,800. The church sent \$4,850 to local charitable groups including the Greensboro Urban Ministry, the Presbyterian Campus Ministry, Habitat for Humanity, and the Interactive Resource Center.

The church also spent a little over \$7,200 to renovate the first floor men's bathroom, however the cost for the renovations were completely funded by contributions from the congregation.

The net result of our operations for 2014 was an excess of expenses over revenues of \$19,295. This deficit was paid out of the church reserves from prior years.

They have asked for donations to fund those nights ,which go toward the supplies needed, the breakfasts provided, laundry and supplies, etc. A list of these expenses is on the back table in the Sanctuary.

Blankets+ is a special mission opportunity for all ages. Some 8,000 congregations and groups across the U.S. hold CWS Blankets+ events, providing funds to help people in need around the world. For over 60 years, CWS has worked in partnership with local communities to identify their needs and access the resources they need to build the foundation for a more viable future, including: blankets, tents, food and other emergency supplies in the wake of a disaster; tools and seeds for refugees returning home to replant their fields; wells for families living in drought prone areas to provide clean, safe water to drink and to irrigate crops and gardens; and literacy training and microcredit for women struggling to realize their potential.
