How Does Change Happen?

A story is told of a monastery that had fallen upon hard times. Once a great order, this spiritual home had lost its vitality. Now there were only five elderly monks left in the decaying mother house: the abbot and four brothers.

In the deep woods surrounding the monastery there lived an ancient and wise hermit. It occurred to the abbot that he should go visit the hermit, seeking guidance. The hermit welcomed the abbot and listened carefully to his story which concluded with a question. "Wise One, do you see some way forward that we might return to our glory of old?"

The Hermit had tears in his eyes, and just sat there for a long time. Finally, he gathered the hands of the Abbot in his own and said, "My friend, I have no wisdom for you. I can only tell you that one of you living in the monastery is the Messiah." Surprised and confused, the Abbot returned to his brothers at the monastery who quickly gathered around him. "What did the hermit say?" "He only said that one of us is the Messiah, but I don't know what he meant."

In the days and weeks that followed, the old monks pondered these words. "Could it be true? The Messiah is one of us?" They could not imagine who among them it could be. "The Abbot? He is a great leader. Or Brother Thomas, who is truly a holy man? Or could he have meant Eldred, our crotchety brother, though he is almost always right? Perhaps quiet Brother Phillip, who is always right there when you need him; or Brother Andrew, the youngest at age 70." And so it went; the pondering of the Abbot and four monks.

And then something happened. There was no conversation or strategy, it just happened. The five old monks began to treat each other with extraordinary respect - on the off chance that one among them might be the Messiah. A new tenderness filled the air. And as each brother offered deep respect, it seemed to bring something new to the community. It was transforming.

Because the monastery was so beautiful, it so happened that people still occasionally came to visit, to picnic on the grounds or meditate in the chapel. And the transformation among the monks permeated the atmosphere. One by one new initiates were drawn to this sacred place. The monastery did not return to its old glory; instead it grew into its new glory.

#### Sunday Study/Group Time in January



Diane Butler Bass, author of "Christianity After Religion; The End of Church and the Beginning of a New Awakening" says that we are at the end of a sea change in religious Christianity which has been going on since the 1970s; that a Fourth Great Awakening is underway and as a result there is a great deal of doubt and discontent in the culture and in churches. Her vision for the new spiritual awakening in Christianity revolves around relational community (belonging), intentional practice (behaving), and experiential belief (believing). Diana has expanded on these ideas in a new VD, Embracing Spiritual Awakening. She

explores what Christianity may look like "beyond religion and beyond the church." Segments include (1) Arriving, (2) Believing, (3) Behaving, (4) Belonging and (5) Awakening. On January 4<sup>th</sup> Chris will lead this 5-part series in Marty's Room. If you would like to join this venture, you are encouraged to purchase the guidebook, *Embracing Spiritual Awakening Guide: Diana Butler Bass on the Dynamics of Experiential Faith*, through the church for \$10.



Ongoing through January is our study of *A New Earth: Awakening to Your Life's Purpose* by Eckhart Tolle, a profoundly spiritual manifesto for a better way of life—and for building a better world. Led by Lora Farlow, in the Parlor.

#### Session Digest, October to December 2014

Over the past three months, the Session has been engaged in a fresh look at our Sunday morning schedule. At the conclusion of our single summer services, the Session was seriously considering the option of a single service during the fall, which would serve all our people. Major motivators for this were: a) the benefit of everyone gathering in a single service, and: b) a simpler schedule on Sunday morning. At the October Session meeting, a number of Sojourners met with the Session to urge that we retain our two services, and further, they requested a lay-led service. The following week the Session led an informal conversation with the entire congregation during the Sunday School hour. Strong points were made for both a single service and two services. After much conversation, the Session elected to honor the request made by these Sojourners to organize a lay-led service. The Session, as well as the Sojourner Coordinating Committee, will review progress early in 2015. Other work over the past three months included:

Supported the work of the Resource Committee in sponsoring the Stewardship Luncheon, the stewardship outreach, and the work on forming a budget for 2015.

Supported the Nominating Committee in their work.

Crafted a document which details the process leading up to sponsoring the reorganization of the Sojourner service. Copies of this document are available in the Church Office.

Secured and presented a tea set gift to Rosser for her good work at Covenant.

Action on phase one to repair our organ. A contract in the amount of \$10,000 has been signed with Allen Harris to bring our organ back into working order.

Awarded a \$500 gift for People to People.

Keeping close watch over our boiler, which will have to be replaced in the near future.

Oversaw the Men's bathroom renovation; expressed support to renovate the downstairs' Women's bathroom.
